#### The Past Year In Review

Dream it, plan it, work it, build it - make it happen!

A little progress each day adds up to big results. The execution of our strategic plan was in full swing this past year. We are "Building the Base" for a strong foundation that will meet the emerging needs of the community for new affordable housing, programs, supports, and services that keep people housed and improve their quality of life.

#### INVESTING IN OUR PEOPLE

Our staff members face challenges every day to meet the needs of those they serve. Bethlehem is very fortunate to employ some of the best in the sector that are dedicated to our clients, our cause, and meeting our mission. To us they are everyday Housing Heroes! We have built and strengthened the management and staff team in each department by investing resources in professional development to build capacity, systems to improve work flow, and find efficiencies that enhance our services to clients and tenants.

#### HOUSING AND PROPERTY MANAGEMENT

Plans are developed to make improvements to our existing capital assets with renovations in the coming year to physically accommodate our growth. This past year we have engaged tenants to get involved through new Tenant Advisory committees and participation in energy efficiency education activities. The maintenance team has been restructured to re-purpose resources that will improve tenancy supports and find efficiencies in managing building maintenance.

#### PROGRAMMING FOR SUPPORT SERVICES

We celebrated the retirements of some long-standing loyal employees and re-built the support team.

We have re-organized support and service programming to be more mobile, by providing communication tools and expanding our outreach to meet clients where they are at in the community.

New and improved program evaluation processes have been implemented to gather information that helps us with quality improvement and telling our stories.

#### EARLY LEARNING CENTRE

Children and their families are welcomed into the Centre to participate in early childhood development and parenting programs offered in partnership with community children's services. With support from the United Way St. Catharines, this year we started offering school age children the opportunity to enjoy after school activities and programs. All of our children and families are very excited to watch the construction progress of our new family playground and can't wait for the gates to be opened in June of 2017.

#### COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

We can't do what we do alone. Our community partners are essential in providing housing and support services. Together we have cleared a path for growth in affordable supportive housing development through leadership with partners and a commitment to ensure long term results. The partnership includes many investors, PennTerra Group, and FirstOntario Credit Union as private sector developers; City of St. Catharines, Niagara Region, and Niagara Regional Housing with municipal tools that further the affordability for tenants and community service partners that participate in the implementation of the Housing and Homeless Action Plan. All have worked diligently and collaboratively to realize a plan for new affordable housing developments in Niagara. The first pilot project model will begin construction in 2017 of a 128-unit building in downtown St. Catharines.

#### COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

A new staff team and volunteer committee was put in place this past year to re-position our development strategy and build momentum for increased community engagement. Our generous donor community supported our annual campaign with \$188,599 plus an additional \$93,000 to build the Bethlehem Place playground. The Billes Family matched that with \$100,000 to our Future Housing Endowment Fund. Thank you never seems to be a big enough word. On behalf of the clients and tenants we serve, we express our heartfelt gratitude to all of our donors that assist us in providing housing and supports to improve their lives.

However, the affordable housing crisis in the Niagara region continues to grow. We are again asking the greater community to get even more involved in the movement to change the direction of a social economic situation that will affect us all. In response, we have launched the *Housing Hero* concept to build awareness, stimulate interest, and inspire participation that will support the movement for housing justice! Our vision is to create a Niagara where everyone has a home.

Over the next year we will showcase real Housing Heroes in our community. A Housing Hero is anyone who believes that everyone deserves a home and takes action in some way to make a difference for those who are challenged with housing stability. No heroic act is too small! ## Helping Women, Men & Families in the Niagara Region

### Our Programs & Services Include

#### TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

Transitional Housing Program (Bethlehem Place) is a staged approach to assist and support client residents to make a successful transition to having a safe, stable home and tenancy. An individual or family household's program can include:

- Outreach supports while on the housing waitlist
- Structured transitional housing with supports for up to one year
- Information, referrals, and connection to community services
- Life skills and capacity building programs
- Child development and parenting supports
- Goal and safety planning, support, and advocacy
- Access to rent subsidy programs and continued supports post-move out to reside in Bethlehem permanent housing sites or in the community throughout the Niagara region

Many continue with supports through our outreach programs while transitioning to living in the community, which helps to ensure housing retention, a stable safe environment, and connection to resources and services.

- 39% of the transitional residents are survivors/ victims of domestic violence
- Our waitlist is 10 20 families at any given time





### 49 families including 79 children lived at Bethlehem Place in 2016–2017

- 37% of the transitional families moved to market rent units
- 52% moved on to live independently in community-based subsidized housing

#### PERMANENT SUPPORTED HOUSING

Permanent Supported Housing is long-term permanent affordable and/or subsidized housing with on-site support and advocacy services. Supports may include information, referrals and connection to community services, as well as social and recreational activities.

- 104 households lived in our permanent supported housing buildings and community homes
- 44% are persons with physical or mental disabilities
- 30% are low-income working families living in market rent units

#### COMMUNITY OUTREACH SUPPORT

Community Outreach Support Program for Homelessness and Violence against Women offers support services in collaboration with service provider/agency partners for individuals and families who are designated homeless or at risk of becoming homeless, and/or who have experienced domestic violence. When an individual reaches out to Bethlehem for help they are connected with a Community Support Worker (CSW) who meets with them in the community. The CSW assesses the needs of the individual, works with them to develop a service plan, and may make referrals that will assist them to achieve their personal goals.

- 256 households were served through the Community Outreach Support Program
- 132 individuals were homeless or at risk of becoming homeless
- 124 women were victims of domestic violence

#### HOUSING FIRST

Housing First Program assists individuals and families who are chronically and episodically homeless to find independent and permanent housing through our Housing First Program, funded by Niagara Regional Housing and Niagara Region Homelessness Services. The underlying principle of Housing First is that people are better able to move forward with their lives if they are first housed. Once the person is housed our Community Support Workers provide client-driven supports to address ongoing housing stability, health and mental health needs, and life skills.

 30 family households were provided community-based affordable housing allowances and community outreach support services



#### PERSONAL CAPACITY BUILDING

Personal Capacity Building Programs include housing supports, goal planning, safety planning, community based life skills for personal capacity building, employability, empowerment, self-esteem and leadership, mental health awareness, legal matters, anger management, healthy lifestyle, budget and money management, and community-based recreational and arts activities.

 72 group sessions were conducted including a variety of life skills, information workshops, personal empowerment and development programs, along with social and recreational activities

#### EARLY LEARNING RESOURCE CENTRES

Early Learning Resource Centres (ELC) includes a variety of parenting and early childhood development programs for families that live at Bethlehem Place and in the community. Our ELC drop-in program provides a healthy and safe educational environment where adults and preschool children interact, play, and learn together. Our After School Club, funded by the United Way St. Catharines and District, provides interactive activities and skills development for children and youth. In 2016, we offered our Early Learning program at St. Christopher School in St. Catharines and St. Patrick School in Niagara Falls one day a week.

In 2016, the Early Learning Centre Program welcomed:

- 1,996 child visits
- 1,100 parent/caregiver visits

### Investing in Our Community

#### **Legacy Partners**

As part of the Niagara Community Foundation's Legacy Partners Program, gifts provided by our loyal donors through bequests and other estate gifts are placed in an endowment fund at the Foundation. Legacy gifts are endowed and preserved in perpetuity with only the investment income used. Income earned on the endowment will provide Bethlehem with a sustainable revenue source so we can continuously provide housing and support services for families in crisis now and in the future.

In 2016, \$1,680 was distributed from our endowment fund and directed to our current annual needs to support the personal growth of individuals and families that reach out to Bethlehem for help. Through our 2016 Matching Gift Campaign the Billes family donated \$100,000 to enhance our Future Housing Endowment Fund.

#### **Empty Bowls**

Our 12th Annual Empty Bowls event took place on Wednesday, March 8th at Club Roma in St. Catharines. We had over 350 guests in attendance with 22 different food and beverage vendors. Guests enjoyed sampling gourmet soups, local wine, and craft beer. This year we had a Silent Auction, Mystery Soup Can raffle, and 50/50 draw. The event raised more than \$30,000 in proceeds after expenses.

The proceeds from the event will help us to continue providing affordable housing, targeted programs, supports, and services to help individuals and families who are designated homeless or at risk of becoming homeless due to issues with poverty, physical disability, mental health, domestic health, domestic violence, and family breakdown.

### Financial Highlights

Our core revenues for the fiscal 2017 increased significantly from the prior fiscal year. Overall revenues were up by 52% from the prior year, largely due to a significant anonymous donor making a capital housing development investment and the sale of two small property assets. These funds will be used for the upcoming new building capital project expected to be completed in the spring of 2018. Without the large donations and sale of the community homes, operating revenues are down by 5%. The decrease is due to revenue received for Capacity Funding for Plumbing Repairs in 2016 but not in 2017, a hydro recovery refund in 2016, and decreased rent revenue due to the sale of the community homes. Expenditures were only \$5,000 lower than last year in correlation with revenues, due to lower fundraising expenses and savings for five months due to the sale of the community homes. Expenditures were consistent with the prior year demonstrating strong management of housing, support programs, and administrative costs. The consistency in year over year financial results is paramount as the organization continues to expand its much-needed services.

### Financial Highlights

The overall net operating surplus (including the capital donation and asset sale) for fiscal 2017 was \$1,296,776. In terms of fund category, direct service programs recorded a surplus of \$22,462 largely due to increased Bingo revenue, new Housing First program revenue, and decreased expenditures in fundraising costs and in administrative expense allocation.

Housing projects recorded a deficit of \$61,427 which was largely a result of hydro cost increases, building maintenance wages were increased to Living Wage levels, the impact of revenue allocations from an estate donation applied in 2016, and hydro recoveries in 2016 but not for 2017.

Long-term debt related to property mortgages was reduced by \$235,217. Restricted reserve fund activity resulted in an overall increase in assets by \$1,275,146 due to the capital investment donation received and the sale of the community properties. All the restricted reserve funds are set aside and tracked in secure investments. These funds are essential to the organization's long-term sustainability, as they provide a concrete level of funds for future capital requirements and emergencies.

The organization is pleased to report we have maintained a healthy and stable financial position moving into fiscal 2018. As a result, Bethlehem Housing and Support Services will continue to provide our valuable and highly regarded services for years to come.





# A BETHLEHEM COMMUNITY SUPPORT WORKER

Mayra's journey as a Community Support Worker (CSW) with Bethlehem Housing and Support Services began three years ago after graduating from the Social Service Worker program at Niagara College. She is one of our team of eight Community Support Workers that provides support services to individuals and families living at Bethlehem Housing or within the community on an outreach basis. The CSW's are an essential part of what makes our organization so successful in helping people overcome their issues related to homelessness, family breakdown, domestic violence, physical disability, and mental health.



Our Community Support Workers are an invaluable resource to our community, making a difference in people's lives every day.

Every day Mayra walks alongside her clients by providing advocacy and support. When supporting clients that are dealing with domestic violence she assists with safety concerns, ensuring the well-being of children, and addressing physical and mental wellness. When supporting clients that are facing homelessness she often learns about histories of childhood trauma or abuse, even though initially a client may only be seeking assistance with housing. "It is important for me to respect my client's boundaries and let them choose what they want to share. In many cases they end up opening up about their past, which helps them to move forward." Mayra works with the client and the issues they are facing in a way that will make them feel comfortable.

Mayra's caseload consists of individuals and families with a mix of ages, genders, abilities, and cultural backgrounds. Since working with a wide variety of demographics, Mayra finds it very important to understand that one size does not fit all. She says, "Everyone handles experiences differently. We are all resilient in our own way. If I come in wearing only one hat and I'm unable to be flexible depending on the client's needs, then nobody benefits."

An important role of our Community Support Workers is building partnerships with other social service organizations and connecting clients to community services. Sometimes Mayra acts as an advocate and supports her clients by accompanying them to meetings with other agencies. "It's very important for my clients to feel as though they have someone to support and advocate for them. It makes them feel believed in and furthers their motivation."

While the role of a CSW can bring on its fair share of challenges, for Mayra, it's important to focus on the rewarding moments. One of her most memorable clients was several years her senior. When they first met, the client was quite apprehensive about their age difference and was unsure if Mayra would be able to relate. She was homeless, battled with addictions, and had mental health issues. She had just finished an addiction treatment program when she came to Bethlehem Place.

In the end the client completely bloomed while working with Mayra. She is now out in the community living on her own, has a beautiful apartment, and has reconnected with her children. Mayra received a beautiful letter from her saying that her life would not be where it's at now if she had not been taught to love herself. "These are the moments that make being a Community Support Worker at Bethlehem so rewarding."
