

## 1986

- The Social Planning Council of St Catharines and Thorold conducted research on the need for second stage housing.
- A concerned group of citizens and local churches came together to form The Bethlehem Project
- Provincial-Federal government funding was secured to build 46 units of second stage housing
- St Catharines City Council accepted an offer to purchase a portion of the site
- The Bethlehem Project was officially incorporated (June 1986)
- A dedication ceremony took place at the construction site on the corner of Lake and Welland

#### 1989

• Opening of the Parent-Child Resource Centre located on the main floor of Bethlehem Place

## 1994

- Elsje (Ellen) Zwart retired
- Julie Dennis our second Executive Director was hired

# 1997

• Opening of Brighter Day Early Learning Centre at Edith Cavell Elementary School

#### 2003

• St Catharines Community Housing Projects Committee was formed as a result of the Forum on Homelessness

#### 2004

- CAW Local 199 committed to provide volunteer labour for the construction of an affordable housing project
- The Bethlehem proposal was short-listed for funding from the Affordable Housing Program from the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation

# 2006

- Public launch of the "Building Community" Capital Campaign (February 2006)
- 1st Empty Bowls fundraiser event
- Construction started on a new 40unit affordable, permanent supported apartment building in St. Catharines
- 85% of the campaign goal was realized
- Marilyn and Norris Walker named the building Genesis Court to reflect "new beginnings"

#### 2009

• Construction started on a new 40unit affordable, permanent supported apartment building in Niagara Falls

#### 2010

- The first tenants moved into Kenmore Court in Niagara Falls
- Official Grand Opening of Kenmore Court (June 21, 2010)
- Manchester Drop-in and Play Centre pilot project began
- Membership approved changes of the organizations name to "Bethlehem Housing and Support Services"

#### 2014

Lori Beech our third Executive Director was hired

## 2015

- Empty Bowls 10th Anniversary
- Bethlehem formed a consortium with a local developer and financier to build affordable housing in Niagara

## 2016

 Lori Beech, Executive Director was appointed as the Chair of the Housing Affordability group of the A Home for All taskforce

# 1987

- Construction of the building began
- Elsje (Ellen) Zwart our first Executive Director was hired
- Regional government funding was approved to hire staff to offer programs and services
- Funds were raised to provide basic furnishings for the units and to provide program delivery

#### 1988

- The first residents moved into Bethlehem Place (February 1, 1988)
- Official Grand Opening of Bethlehem Place (May 14, 1988)
- A volunteer coordinator was appointed and a team of nine front line staff were hired to provide program delivery

# 1998

- 1st community support home opened
- 10th Anniversary Gala Dinner & Cabaret

## 2001

• Skills of Success program created and offered in five cities across the region

#### 2002

- Opening of the Billes House community support home
- The project was named the Billes House in honour of the co-founders of Canadian Tire, J.W. and A.J. Billes
- Habitat for Humanity recruited 60 volunteers and put in more than 400 hours of in-kind service to renovate the home

#### 2005

- Received approval from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing
- A community investment of \$1.2 million was required to complete the project
- Marilyn and Norris Walker were announced as Honourary Chairs of the "Building Community" Capital Campaign
- The Community Transitional Housing Support Program began

#### 2007

- The first tenants moved into Genesis Court (March 1, 2007)
- Official Grand Opening of Genesis Court (June 28, 2007)
- Niagara Region and the Niagara
   Economic Development Corporation
   presented the Genesis Court project with
   a Niagara Community Design Award

# 2008

- 20th Anniversary Celebration Brunch (February 2008)
- 20th Anniversary Open House (September 2008)
- 20th Anniversary Harvest Dinner (October 2008)

## 2012

- Launched our new mobile Early Learning Program
- Bethlehem began recruitment of private landlords as part of our participation in the NRH Homes First Housing Allowance pilot project
- Bethlehem staff actively participated in the development of 10-year Housing and Homelessness Action Plan in collaboration with the community's housing advocates and agencies

## 2013

- 25th Anniversary Luncheon (January 27, 2013)
- Julie Dennis retired

# 2017

- Revitalized the Bethlehem Place playground to create a Naturalized Family Park
- Bethlehem Place lobby and main floor were renovated to create an accessible and welcoming environment
- Ground Breaking Ceremony for new affordable housing development at 111 Church Street (November 22, 2018)

## 2018

• Construction began at 111 Church Street that will provide 127 affordable rental units with on-site support services and community amenities.
